"Whether we are talking, acting, thinking, solving problems ... we are concerned with meanings."


"Human engagement in the world is first and foremost a process of negotiating meaning."


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"Negotiation" means ...

- Reaching an agreement
- An accomplishment that requires attention and readjustment
- A historical and dynamic process
- · Continuous interaction, gradual achievement
- Give-and-take
- The world does not impose meanings on us
- We do not make meanings independently of the world

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"Participation" & "Reification" mean ...

The term "participation" describes

the social experience of living in the world in terms of membership in social communities and active involvement in social enterprises.

The concept of "reification" refers to

the process of giving form to our experience by producing objects that congeal this experience into 'thingness'.

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Duality of Participation & Reification

Require and enable each other (no opposition)

Intensity not linked (no spectrum)

Imply each other (no substitution)

Transform their relation (no translation)

Describe an interplay (no classification)

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
